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In a world of Collective Opinion – is Individual opinion fading?



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hile selecting a hotel to stay on a holiday, a movie on OTT, a product on Amazon/E-Commerce sites, do you find yourself looking at the 8+/star rating, reading reviews, pondering over the negative experience of others, looking for shoddy pictures uploaded? For that matter, any decision we are making today is governed by the "crowd" or the "collective" experience of that product or service. Today, aren't we in a world of taking decisions based on collective opinion?

While that has been defining a consumer's behaviour over the last decade or so (with easy



access to content on the internet and social media platforms), the communication experts have understood the power of persuasion of likes and reviews. Thousands of bots and paid (or unpaid) hands are available to drive up a sale through reviews and likes, based on the wishes of the pusher (the one with an objective or an agenda). And aren't we falling for the bait?

We all already know that Influencers are what they are because they are paid for it! To Influence their followers. It is as simple as that. Somebody is paying for that content. So that those who follow the influencer, get convinced of the narrative. This is not just for products and services. It applies to matters of geo-politics, faith, personalities, and a whole lot of other themes. There is someone funding for a purpose! Come to think of it, even St. Mother Teresa of Calcutta is not spared by these sponsored content creators.

At this juncture, for all of us in this era of data and content explosion, it is prudent to delve upon this extract from a Harvard Business Review article on 'The Elements of Good Judgement' which says, "Think carefully about where the underlying data is coming from and the likely interests of the people supplying it."

What Aristotle said 2300 years ago may hold true even today, when he asked each one of us to "Be a free thinker and don't accept everything you hear as truth. Be critical and evaluate what you believe in".

How do we navigate in today's world of information overload? Let's try and understand some basic steps:





Problem is not with the content creators. They have their agenda and are paid for it. Issue is with those who get swayed by this content.

Information Overload:

This is bound to remain in years to come. With the "able" support of AI and GenAI, content is going to be superfluous and enchanting, everywhere we look. One simply cannot ignore this.

When a large number of content creators pitch for sympathizing for one side in a war, a whole generation of protestors line up at universities, embassies, public functions, and trade centers. Be it Gaza, be it Peta, be it Fossil Fuel, be it Ghar Wapasi. Look at it carefully. The problem is not with the content creators. They have their agenda and are getting paid for it. The issue is with those who get swayed by this content.

Fact Checking:

While fact checking has been a buzzword for a few years with a number of sites enabling the same, it is still a less relied upon tool. As long as few trusted players/entities endorse

a view or content, it is sufficient for mass followers to believe in that line of thinking/narrative and as a result fact-checking goes to shreds. Instead of checking facts and the truth behind a narrative, we look for people (like us) who have endorsed the same narrative. Once confirmed, we ourselves are sure that there is no need to check facts.

Critical Thinking:

Our ability to look at multiple facets of a narrative will empower us to form a balanced opinion. This is not easy. We live in a time and era where patience to look for more angles of a particular story is limited.

Then there is this overhanging thing called 'personal bias'. What we mean by personal bias is that we already believe in something. Then, when content is thrown at us, we try to justify it to ourselves as we are already biased. Any amount of counter narrative is not acceptable to us then. An example would be, suppose, we have grown up watching and seeing that it's alright to physically hit a woman. Now, if we see content/ articles that say that beating one's own wife is physical abuse and against law. We will try to find memories, articles, or opinions which will confirm to us that

'beating is ok'. That is the impact of personal bias.

In critical thinking, it is important to not go by popular opinion or narrative that has huge likes and shares. What is needed is to think objectively, like:

- Why is this narrative being shared?
- What is the purpose of this narrative?
- Do I personally agree with this narrative or not?
- What is my own or my family's value system?
- What are my own elders' teachings?
- What do wise people say about this topic?
- Am I just following everybody else or do I have a point of view?

All of the above doesn't need time. It just needs self-reflection and a mind that is ready to think for itself and not follow the popular belief.

It's appropriate to reflect on one of our modern personalities that we consider as a self-made success, Elon Musk, wherein he says "I think it's important to reason from first principles rather than by analogy. The normal way we conduct our lives is by analogy. [With analogy] we are doing this because it is like something else that was done, or it is like what other people are doing. [With first principles] you boil things down to the most fundamental truths, and then reason up from there."

Personal Opinion:

As we grow up, we tend to have strong feelings about situations, themes and topics. Whether it's about customs, practices, religion, teachings, way of life, etc. This we call our personal opinion. We often defend these opinions vociferously in



families and friends groups. Whether it's about our career choices, our friends, music that we like & follow, even subjects like LGBT, Pro Life, Live-ins, wars, etc. We all have our own opinion. We must. That's what makes us a unique individual. A personality that is me. But there is a catch!

Bishop Fulton Sheen emphasized that personal opinions, while important, should be grounded in truth and not simply based on personal preference or feelings.

One of his famous quotes states, "Counsel/ advice involving right and wrong should never be taken from someone who does not say their prayers".

Lets connect the dots..

Bishop Fulton suggests that opinions should be based on truths and not personal feelings/preferences.

Critical thinking encourages us to search for the truth on first principles and not popular narrative.

Fact Checking allows us to understand the Why behind narratives, content, and trends.

Information overload is then just a deluge of information. Just like hoardings on Marine Drive which we never see while walking or driving past. Because it is just content.

To conclude...

In this era of internet explosion and content overload (especially the ones that get viral, which are mostly negative or shaming), let us take a small pause. Do a bit of fact checking in terms of, Why is this being shared, by Whom, and for What. After that, put on the hat of a Critical Thinker – because, I am who I am – with a mind of my own. I am not the crowd. So, what is my own thought on this Narrative/Content? What are my value systems? What are my teachings? What are the wise thoughts on this?

In today's time and day, FOMO also allows space for JOMO (Joy Of Missing Out). Mind you, JOMO does not mean standing out of the crowd, but for having the courage to fact check, critically thinking using your own brand and forming personal opinion.

or many families, the start of a school year means new schedules, sharpened pencils, and packed lunches. But for Catholic families, this season invites something deeper; a return not only to learning, but to living out our faith more intentionally. Going back to school is not just an academic journey; it's a spiritual pilgrimage where both students and families are called to grow in holiness.

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The Sacred Start: Spiritual Preparation

Before new uniforms are worn or books are opened, we must prepare our children spiritually. This begins at home — where family prayer becomes both foundation and fortress. Morning prayers, evening rosaries, or a shared reading from Scripture each night sets the tone for a Christ-centered school year.

Crucially, the sacraments — especially the Eucharist and Reconciliation are not optional extras, but the lifeblood of spiritual strength. Daily Mass, when possible, allows students to receive the very Body and Blood of Christ, the "source and summit of the Christian life" (CCC, 1324). This daily communion nourishes the soul and equips students with divine grace to face each day with peace, clarity, and courage.

Likewise, frequent confession clears the conscience and strengthens virtue. Through the sacrament of reconciliation, students are not only forgiven but formed — learning humility, accountability, and the mercy of God. As the Catechism says, "confession... helps us form our conscience, fight against evil tendencies, let ourselves be healed" (CCC 1458). A cleansed heart is more open to truth, learning, and love.

The Role of the Student: A Witness in the World

Catholic students are more than learners — they are young disciples. In classrooms, canteens, and sports fields, they are called to be the light of the world (Matthew 5:14). Their role is not passive. They must live the Gospel with courage: showing kindness to the outcast, standing firm in truth, and choosing honesty when it's hard.

Students can set spiritual goals — like beginning the day with a quiet prayer, wearing a sacramental (like a cross, rosary

or scapular), or engaging in simple acts of charity. These habits strengthen identity and remind them that faith is not reserved for Sunday but woven into every day.

Forming Hearts Through Service and Community

Faith grows stronger in fellowship with the community. Catechism class groups, choirs, altar service, and outreach programs give students the opportunity to live out their beliefs through action. Whether helping the poor, leading worship, or cleaning the parish grounds, students develop leadership, compassion, and a deeper love for the Body of Christ. They experience the Church as living, breathing, and joyful.

The Role of Parents: First Teachers of Faith

The Catechism teaches that parents are the "first educators of their children" (CCC 1653). A child's faith journey begins and deepens through the rhythms and witness



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of the home. As school begins, parents can anchor daily life in prayer, blessing children before school, praying the protection prayer, or setting Sunday as truly sacred.

Even simple family traditions like attending First Friday Masses, celebrating feast days, or ending the day with an examination of conscience, help children feel connected to a living, breathing Church that surrounds them with love and stability.

Navigating the Secular with Catholic Conviction

Today's students are often met with ideologies that challenge their faith. From moral relativism to pressure to conform, the secular world tests Catholic values. This is where formation must become conviction.

Ephesians 6:13 exhorts us: "Take up the full armour of God... that you may be able to stand firm." Students need to know why they believe, not just what they believe. Parents and schools must prepare them to answer

questions with clarity, love, and courage.

Teaching children to say, "I respect your view, but my faith teaches me otherwise," empowers them to stand firm without being hostile. Understanding Church teachings on life, identity, and love allows them to navigate a confusing world with the compass of truth.

A Practical Mission

So, what can Catholic families do as they return to school?

- Begin each day with a family prayer or blessing.
- Prioritize Sunday Mass and the sacraments.
- Choose Catholic media or saint stories over empty screen time.
- Volunteer in a parish activity or charity.
- Create a sacred space at home.

These small acts, repeated with love, become habits and habits shape saints, which we are all called to become.

A Holy Journey Ahead

Back to school is more than a change of schedule. It's a recommitment to our mission as Catholic families. With prayer, service, and courage, our children can enter their classrooms as apostles in disguise. Parents can lead by faith, and schools can remain beacons of truth in a noisy world.

As St. Thérèse of Lisieux said, "Holiness consists simply in doing God's will, and being just what God wants us to be." So, this year, may our students and our families be exactly that: joyfully faithful, courageously holy, and fully alive in Christ.

Let every lesson learned, every challenge faced, and every act of love offered be done Ad Maiorem Dei Gloriam — for the greater glory of God.

ഇന്നു നാം ജീവിക്കുന്നത് വലിയ മാറ്റങ്ങൾ അനുഭവ പ്പെടുന്ന കാലഘട്ടത്തിലാണ്. സാങ്കേതിക വിദ്യയുടെ അതിവേഗ വികസനം, പ്രത്യേകിച്ച് കൃത്രിമ ബു ദ്ധിയുടെ (Artificial Intelligence – AI) വളർച്ച, മനു ഷ്യ ജീവിതത്തിന്റെ എല്ലാ മേഖലകളിലും വളരെ വലിയ സ്വാധീനം ചെലുത്തുന്നുണ്ട്. വിദ്യാഭ്യാസ രംഗം ഈ മാറ്റങ്ങളിൽ അതൃധികം ബാധിക്കപ്പെടുന്ന പ്രധാന മേഖലയാണ്. വിദ്യാർത്ഥികളുടെയും അധ്യാപകരുടെയും, രക്ഷിതാക്കളുടെയും സമീപ നങ്ങൾ ഇന്ന് ആധുനിക സാങ്കേതികതയുടെ ചുവടു പിടിക്കുകയാണ്. ഈ വലിയ മാറ്റത്തിന്റെ ചുവട് പിടിച്ചുകൊണ്ട് ലിയോ പതിനാലാമൻ മാർപാപ്പ സഭ യുടെ ഈ ആധുനിക കാലഘട്ടത്തിൽ ദൗതൃ ബോ ധത്തെക്കുറിച്ച് വളരെ മനോഹരമായി പറഞ്ഞു വെക്കുന്നു.

2025 ൽ കത്തോലിക്കാ സഭയുടെ ഇടയനായി തിര ഞ്ഞെടുക്കപ്പെട്ട ലിയോ XIV മാർപാപ്പ, ഏകദേശം ഒരു നൂറ്റാണ്ടിന് ശേഷമാണ് "Leo" എന്ന പാപ്പാ പേ രിലേക്ക് സഭയെ തിരിച്ചുകൊണ്ടുവന്നത്. അദ്ദേഹ ത്തിന്റെ നേതൃത്വം സാംസ്കാരികവും സാങ്കേതിക വുമായ വലിയ മാറ്റങ്ങളുടെ പശ്ചാത്തലത്തിലാണ് തുടങ്ങിയത്. കൃത്രിമ ബുദ്ധിയുടെ (Artificial Intelligence — AI) സങ്കീർണ്ണതകളും പ്രചണ്ഡതയും ലോകമാകെ വിദ്യാഭ്യാസരംഗത്തെ മാറ്റിമറിച്ചു കൊ ണ്ടിരിക്കുന്ന ഈ കാലഘട്ടത്തിൽ അദ്ദേഹം സഭയുടെ ദൗത്യബോധം ആധുനിക ലോകവുമായി സംവ ദിക്കേണ്ടതിന്റെ ആവശ്യകത ഉയർത്തികാട്ടുന്നു.

2025 മേയ് 15ന് Brothers of the Christian Schools അഭിസംബോധന ചെയ്തപ്പോൾ, ലിയോ XIV മാർ പാപ്പ ഒരു പ്രധാനപ്പെട്ട കാര്യം എല്ലാവരെയും ഉദ് ബോധിപ്പിച്ചു. "നിങ്ങളുടെ ബലിപീഠം ക്ലാസ് മുറി യാണ്". അതായത്, പഠനം ഒരു മൗലികാവകാശം മാത്രമല്ല, അതിന് ആത്മീയ പ്രാധാന്യവും ഉണ്ട്.



അധ്യാപകർ വെറും വിജ്ഞാനദായകരല്ല; അവർ കുട്ടികളിൽ ദൈവിക പ്രതിഛായകൾ വളർത്താ നുള്ള ദൗത്യം പേറുന്നവരാണ്.

പാപ്പയുടെ അഭിപ്രായത്തിൽ, ഉന്നതമായ വിദ്യാഭ്യാ സം രൂപപ്പെടുത്തുന്നത് മാനുഷികതയെ ആധാരമാ ക്കിയാണ്. വിദ്യാർത്ഥിയുടെ മസ്തിഷ്കത്തിൽ ബു ദ്ധിപരമായ അറിവുകൾ മാത്രം വിളമ്പിയാൽ പോ രാ; അതിന്റെ കൂടെ മറ്റുള്ളവരെ സ്നേഹിക്കാനും കരുണയോടെ നോക്കാനും അവന്റെ ജീവിതത്തിൽ ഒരു കൈത്താങ്ങായി മാറുവാനും നമ്മുടെ വിദ്യാ ഭ്യാസം കൊണ്ട് സാധിക്കണം. ഈ സമീപനമാണ് പോപ്പിന്റെ ദൗത്യശ്രദ്ധയിൽ അത്യന്താപേക്ഷിതമായ മാറ്റം.

2020കൾക്കുള്ളിലെ ഏറ്റവും വലിയ സാങ്കേതിക പരിണാമം AI ആണെന്ന് പറയുന്നത് അതിശയമല്ല. അത് വിദ്യാഭ്യാസരംഗത്ത് അറിവ് പകർച്ചയെ വേഗ ത്തിലാക്കുകയും, വ്യക്തിഗത പഠനമാതൃകകൾ അ വതരിപ്പിക്കുകയും, കാര്യക്ഷമത വർദ്ധിപ്പിക്കുകയും ചെയ്യുന്നു. എന്നാൽ, ലിയോ XIV മാർപാപ്പ മുന്നറി യിപ്പ് നൽകുന്നു: "മനുഷ്യന്റെ ഹൃദയവും ആത്മാ വും കണക്കാക്കാതെ, കൃത്രിമ ബുദ്ധിക്ക് ഓരോ വി ഷയത്തെയും വിലയിരുത്താൻ അനുവദിക്കരുത്."

AI അധിഷ്ഠിത പഠന പ്ലാറ്റ്ഫോമുകൾ, അധ്യാപക രെ പകർന്നുവെയ്ക്കുന്ന ചാറ്റ്ബോട്ടുകൾ, വിദ്യാർ ത്ഥികളെ ശേഖരിച്ച ഡാറ്റയുടെ അടിസ്ഥാനത്തിൽ റാങ്ക് ചെയ്യുന്നതിന്റെ വ്യാപനം - ഇവയെല്ലാം മാനു ഷിക ബോധത്തിന്റെ അഭാവത്തിൽ അപകടകാരി യായിത്തീരാം. ഒരു യന്ത്രം ഒരുപാട് കണക്കുകൾ പ ഠിപ്പിക്കുമെങ്കിലും, സ്നേഹവും കരുണയും ഉത്തര വാദിത്തബോധവും അതിന് നൽകാനാവില്ല. ഇതുര ണ്ടും ഒന്നു ചേർന്നുപോകുമ്പോഴാണ് വിദ്യാഭ്യാസം അർത്ഥവത്തായി തീരുക.

ലിയോ XIV മാർപാപ്പയുടെ ഉപദേശ പ്രകാരം, വി ദ്യാഭ്യാസം ഒരു 'formation' ആയിരിക്കണം. അതായത്, കുട്ടിയെ സമഗ്രമായ ഒരു വ്യക്തിത്വമായി ആത്മികവും ബൗദ്ധികവുമായ വളർച്ചയ്ക്ക് വഴിയൊരുക്കണം. AI അധിഷ്ഠിത പഠനം വിദ്യാർത്ഥിയുടെ ബൗദ്ധിക ഉന്നതിക്ക് സഹായകമാകുമ്പോഴും, അതിന്റെ നീതി നിഷ്ഠയും സാമൂഹിക ഉത്തരവാദിത്തവും ക്രമീകരിക്കേണ്ടത് മനുഷ്യ സമൂഹം തന്നെയാണ്.

അധ്യാപകരുടെ ഇടപെടലിന്റെ അപരിമിത ശക്തി


AI അധ്യാപകനെ പകരം വെയ്ക്കുകയാണെന്ന ആ ശങ്ക ഏറെക്കാലമായി നിലനിൽക്കുന്നു. എന്നാൽ ലിയോ XIV മാർപാപ്പയുടെ കാഴ്ചപ്പാട് ഏറെ വ്യ ക്തമാണ്: 'അധ്യാപകന്റെ പ്രചോദനാത്മക സാന്നി ധ്യത്തിന് AI പകരം വയ്ക്കാൻ സാധിക്കില്ല'. അ ധ്യാ പകന്റെ കണ്ണിലെ കരുണ, അവന്റെ സ്പർശം, ഒരു വിദ്യാർത്ഥിയോടുള്ള വ്യക്തിപരമായ പ്രചോദനം - ഇത് യന്ത്രങ്ങൾക്ക് തരാൻ കഴിയില്ല. അതി നാൽ, പുതിയ കാലഘട്ടത്തിൽ AI സഹപാഠിയായി ത്തീരട്ടെ, പക്ഷേ അധ്യാപകൻ ഗുരുവായിത്തീരണം എന്നതാണ് അദ്ദേഹത്തിന്റെ ആഹ്വാനം.

n May 5, 2013, I was blessed with a moment I will carry in my heart forever. That day, the Catholic Church celebrated the *Day of Confraternities and Popular Piety* with a solemn Holy Mass at St. Peter's Basilica in the Vatican. I was a deacon, studying in Rome, preparing for priestly ordination later that year. Along with fifteen other deacons from different parts of the world, I had been invited to assist at this special Holy Mass and distribute Holy Communion to the cardinals. It was already a great honour. But God's


plan, as always, held more than I expected. The day before the event, we gathered in front of St. Peter's Basilica for a practice session. The Master of Pontifical Liturgical Ceremonies, Msgr. Guido Marini, approached me and said: "You will be standing next to the Holy Father assisting him at the altar." For a moment, I was stunned. Out of all the deacons, I and one other had been chosen to serve directly at the side of Pope Francis. That night, I could barely sleep. The thought that I would walk beside the Vicar of Christ, assisting him in offering the Eucharist, was humbling beyond words.

The next morning, I made my way to the Vatican. We vested in silence and prayer. Then Pope Francis entered. He greeted us with simplicity and warmth, and began vesting. I stood silently, watching him. There was something radiant about his presence - calm, humble, holy. In my heart, I felt: A saint has come down from heaven.

As I walked beside Pope Francis, during the procession to the altar set in the open air of St. Peter's Square, I felt that each step was a prayer, each moment sacred. The Holy

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Mass commenced, and as I stood beside the Vicar of Christ. facing St. Peter's Square filled with faithful. I felt as though I were standing at the gates of heaven, surrounded by the profound beauty of the liturgy - the prayers, the hymns. At the time of the Sign of Peace, the Holy Father turned to me, took my hands gently in his, and said: "Peace be with you." It was not just a liturgical phrase - it was a moment of divine encounter. In that instant, peace didn't just pass from his lips - it flowed into me. I felt an overwhelming stillness, as though heaven itself had leaned down and embraced my soul. He smiled, extended his hand in blessing, and then handed me a rosary. As he gave it to me, he said gently, "Catch hold of the hands of Mamma Mary."



In November 2024, I had planned to attend a medical expo in Germany. Alongside this, I nurtured a long-held dream: to see and receive blessings from our beloved Pope Francis. I've always admired him for his humility and his commitment to serving the poor and needy.

While browsing the Vatican website, I came across a special conference that included a private audience with the Pope. Filled with hope, I registered for myself and my parents, praying for a miracle.

After his address, each attendee had the opportunity to approach him for a personal blessing. As I waited in line, my heart pounded with anticipation. But when I finally stood before him, his warm, joyful smile calmed every nerve. His presence radiated peace, love, and compassion.

I gently held his hand, bowed, and said in Italian:

"Buongiorno Papa, Benedica me e la mia famiglia Papa" (Good morning beloved Father, please bless me and my family).

He smiled warmly, blessed me, and said, "Pray for me too."

Afterward, we took photos with him and received blessed rosaries—gifts that now hold immense spiritual significance for us.

The Flection

13th March 2013 proved to be historical as it marked a radical and overwhelming change in the administration of the Catholic Church. Cardinal Jorge Mario Bergoglio, was elected as the 266th successor of St. Peter and his very first public moments proved to be extraordinary. As Cardinal Jean-Louis Tauran announced the pontifical name as Francis, it marked a change in the tradition as every pope for the past 470 years had taken the name of a predecessor to both honour them and signal their intention to emulate them. Cardinal Bergoglio had instead taken the name of Francis, a pontifical name never used in the history of papacy. The only pontifical name that hasn't been used more than once is Peter, the name of the first Pope. And it wasn't over yet as Pope Francis stepped on the balcony of St. Peter's Basilica without wearing the red mozzetta, a short, red, cape-like garment usually worn by the popes for their first public appearance. He didn't use a written text to greet the faithful, rather his words were very informal-straight from his heart. Before imparting his Apostolic Urbi et Orbi blessing he asked the people to pray for him as he bowed his head in front of the people.

A Shepherd Among the People

The Church witnessed a profound transformation: a theology grounded in humility, love, and mutual respect expressed through a simple act. The global perception of Church leadership shifted—from a traditionally formal and distant model to one characterized by warmth, solidarity, and genuine human connection. With Pope Francis, the papal role no longer stood above the people but among them, as one of their own.

Even when facing the horrors of war and the suffering caused by displacement, he did not retreat into the safety of diplomatic protocol. In the pain of refugees, the cries of the poor, the scars of abuse, and the loneliness of the marginalized, he recognized the presence of Christ. He knelt before them—not for show, but out of sincere love and reverence. These moments were not staged; they were genuine encounters with the divine on the edges of society.



Pope Francis dedicated himself to revitalizing Church structures, correcting what had gone wrong and restoring what needed healing.


Contribution towards the Syro-Malabar Church

n May 8th, 2025, the Sistine Chapel surprised everyone with white smoke earlier than expected. Within moments, St. Peter's Square overflowed with eager



As he stepped onto the balcony of St. Peter's Basilica, the Pope appeared visibly moved, his demeanor shy yet composed. Unlike his predecessor, he appeared in the traditional mozzetta and red stole adorned with golden embroidery. Despite being American, he addressed the crowd in Italian, Spanish, and Latin—curiously, not a word in English. His chosen papal name hinted at a commitment to balance orthodoxy and modernity, tradition and progressive thought. He identified himself as a son of St. Augustine and invited all present to recite the "Hail Mary" together.







As Catholics, we rejoice in our new Pope. Let us draw a lesson from his election: not to blindly trust media and social media narratives, but to listen directly to his teachings and writings. Above all, let us unite in prayer for his guidance, that he may lead the Church according to God's will and the guidance of the Holy Spirit, fostering peace and unity in the world.





"He suffered and was crucified in the days of Pontius Pilate, died and was buried."

After our reflections on the Mysteries of Incarnation i.e. conception and birth of Jesus, we ponder on the first part of the Paschal Mysteries of our Lord, namely – passion, crucifixion, death and burial. On the eve of His Passion, Jesus instituted the Holy Qurbana and transformed the Last Supper into the memorial of His Sacrifice, His voluntary offering to the Father for the salvation of men. "Jesus includes the Apostles in His own offerings and bids them to perpetuate it. By doing so the Lord institutes His Apostles as priests of the New Covenant." (CCC #611)

From the Upper Room, located on Mount Zion in Jerusalem; Jesus and his Apostles walked across the Kidron Valley to the Mount of Olives and entered the Garden of Gethsemane. In *Jesus of Nazareth: Holy Week*, Pope Benedict XVI reveals that on the way "Jesus may have sung the Hallel Psalms (Ps. 113-118,136)."

During the Good Friday liturgy, we read and meditate the Passion narrative of Jesus from the Holy Gospels, beginning with the agony in the garden, followed by His arrest, the trial, mocking, flogging, beatings, crown of thorns pushed into His skull, carrying of the cross, stripped bare, crucified on the Cross, His death on the Cross, taken down and eventually laid in the tomb.

At the garden, our Lord prayed, "Father, if it is your will, take this cup from me; yet not my will but yours be done" (Lk 22:42). Jesus foresaw the

sacrifice He faced. He Himself had said to the apostles: "My soul is very sorrowful even unto death." (Mk 14:34) St. Luke, the physician notes that Jesus prayed so intensely that "his sweat became like great drops of blood falling upon the ground" (22:44).

"This phenomenon" Dr. Pierre Barbet explains, "is extremely rare, is provoked by some great mental disturbance, following on deep emotion or great fear and is known in the profession as haematidrosis, and consists of an intense vasodilatation of the subcutaneous capillaries." His book A Doctor at Calvary, continues: "They become extremely distended and burst when they come into contact with the millions of sweat glands and the blood mingles with the sweat."

Other than, the Virgin Mary, the Nicene Creed mentions Pontius Pilate. One of the fundamental reasons for this inclusion is to emphasise the historicity of Jesus' Passion. The existence of Pontius Pilate can be verified by sources outside of the Gospels and his name provides a powerful reminder that Jesus' death occurred within the context of Roman rule and at a specific date in human history.

"Jesus' violent death was not the result of chance in an unfortunate coincidence of circumstances, but part of the mystery of God's plan." (CCC #599) By sending His own Son in the form of a slave, in the form of a fallen humanity, on account of sin, for our sake, God "made Him to be sin who knew no sin, so that in Him we might become the righteousness of God". (2 Cor 5:21)

"During Christ's period in the tomb, his divine person continued to assume both his soul and his body, although they were separated from each other by death." (CCC #630) For this reason the dead Christ's body "saw no corruption" (Acts 13:37).






